

St. Paul says in 2 Tim. 1:5, that Eunice, the mother of Timothy, was a woman of "sincere faith." She loved her Lord and Savior, and she lived her faith. It is our prayer that we may all be granted this same sincere faith. God be with you and bless you as you spend time in Meditation and in Cooking With Eunice.

Meditation — <u>"HANDS"</u>

Hands. Have you ever looked at people's hands, or studied your own? They may be large or petite, wrinkly, scarred, warty, smooth, tanned or blue-veined. Most have fingers long and thin, or stubby and chubby, straight, crooked, big knuckled, arthritic, clean, stained, or missing. And thankfully, there are even hands of metal, plastic and computer components! Hands are always doing something. We use them daily to grab the bedcovers we lift off when we awake, to button a shirt, to hold utensils of food, and on and on. We use our hands to help others, and look to the hands of others for help. When we are in need, it often comes from the hands of strangers - police officers, first responders, health care professionals, a concerned bystander. We don't know those hands, but we need them. There are hands of soldiers gripping weapons, of politicians raised in oath, of builders operating machinery, of a musician on an instrument - of a pastor baptizing a child. Aren't hands amazing? Such a precious part of God's Creation! After my husband, Bill, died three years ago, I felt our love was such that I would never forget anything about him, but no matter how hard I try, there are some things I just cannot seem to hang onto. While the memory of our love is strong, little things about him are fading. Oddly though, the one thing that remains vivid, is the feel of his hand on mine. Beginning with our first dates, his left hand was always reaching for and holding onto my right hand. It seemed to happen without thought. When I exited our vehicle, his hand was waiting for mine. If I rose from being seated, his hand grabbed mine. Before I drifted to sleep each night, his left hand squeezed my right. And as my muscles weakened from disease, and I grew weary from pain and despair, his grip grew tighter. His left hand held me, while his strong right hand was there to help me. Even when a walker forced my hands away from him, he was still at my side - and, I still felt his hand squeeze mine each night. I was his, and I was not afraid. But, when death yanked his hand from me, I felt a more powerful and more loving hand still gripping mine. This was not the hand of a stranger, here one moment and gone the next, and it was not a hand death could ever take from me. No. This was a hand I read about in Isaiah 41:13, "For I am the Lord, your God, who takes hold of your right hand and says to you, 'Do not fear; I will help you.'" And in these beautiful words from Asaph's song to the Lord, Psalm 73, "Yet I am always with You; You hold me by my right hand. God is the strength of my heart and my portion (my life) forever." Yes! In my Baptism, God took possession of me, and from that moment, through Bill's death, and still, He holds my hand, and His grip just gets tighter. I am His! He said, "Do not fear; I will help you," but why? He tells me, "My grace is sufficient for you" (2 Cor. 12:9), but what is this "grace," and again, why? David knew "why" when he wrote Psalm 16 and sang, "I have set the Lord always before me. Because He is at my right hand, I will not be shaken. My heart is glad . . . because you will not abandon me to the grave, nor will you let your Holy One see decay." He was speaking of the Christ! With HANDS nailed to a cruel cross, He grabbed me by my hand into death and then, into new life with Him! This is God's Grace -His mercy and favor - His unfailing LOVE for us! His right HAND - HIS POWER - is our help and protection, our strength and joy! We must not be afraid! CHRIST, our RISEN LORD, is ever holding us by His Hand. HE is our SALVATION - the source of LIFE with HIM, FOREVER! With Easter Joy in Christ! Duannah

1. Preheat oven to 400°. Butter a jumbo (Texas-size) **Cooking With Eunice — Chocolate-Raspberry Cheesecake Muffins** muffin tin, or use spray oil. Perfect for Easter brunch after church! (Adapted from a Feb 2021 Texas 2. In a small bowl, whisk together flour, baking Co-op Power magazine recipe.) Makes 6 jumbo muffins. powder, baking soda and salt. 2 cups flour 2 eggs 3. In a large bowl, whisk together sugar, eggs, 2 tsp. baking powder 1 tsp. orange zest orange zest and vanilla until blended. Whisk in 1 tsp. vanilla 1/2 tsp. baking soda butter, then add milk. 1/4 tsp. salt 3/4 cup milk 4. Stir in flour mixture until just blended. Gently 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter, 3/4 cup sugar fold in berries, cheese and chocolate. melted & cool 5. Fill muffin tins with all of the batter. 1 cup raspberries (or any berry), diced if large 6. Optional topping: combine 4 tsp. raw sugar, 2 tsp. 3 ounces cream cheese, cut into chunks white granulated sugar, 1/8 tsp. cinnamon. Sprinkle 1 cup chocolate chips 1 tsp. on top of muffins. 7. Bake 20-24 minutes.

Guidelines for In-Person Worship at Christ

We ask all those who plan to attend the worship service or discipleship class to:

- ✤ Avoid all handshaking, hugging, or touching of any kind with those outside their family.
- ✤ Bring a mask and wear it at all times within our facilities (except when receiving the Lord's Supper).
- Maintain social distancing at all times while entering/exiting/attending our worship and/or discipleship class.
- Please do not touch/handle/use any of the hymnals for any purpose (hymns/liturgies will be printed in the bulletin).
- Please wash and/or sanitize your hands often while in attendance at Christ (i.e. entering the sanctuary, prior to Holy Communion, leaving the sanctuary).
- Please do not gather in the narthex, sanctuary, or hallways to talk before or after worship.
- Please wait for your row to be dismissed at the end of worship and proceed to exit the building (unless you are attending the discipleship study or using the restroom).
- Please do not attend worship if you have any signs of illness (i.e. elevated temperature, sore throat, coughing, body aches, etc).
- Err on the side of caution be respectful of others' fears and precautions
- Come prepared to praise and thank God for bringing us back together, and continue to ask God to protect us as we once again gather for worship.
