Meditation — "The HAIRCUT"

I got a haircut the other day. It felt strange to be out in public, but there were COVID-19 rules to protect the stylists and clients. Only a few were allowed in at one time, and everyone had to wear a mask. I asked my stylist if anyone had refused to obey their rules. She said only two. They were told they could not enter without a mask unless they had a medical condition that prevented it, and they were "free" to go elsewhere. In both cases, the person voiced their objection and left without incident. In preparation for attending a worship service, I reviewed our church's guidelines for protection from the virus - wear a mask, no hugging, don't touch the hymnals, use hand sanitizer, etc. It brought to mind something I read in George Nielsen's book, Johann Kilian, Pastor, A Wendish Lutheran in Germany and Texas. The Wends, ancestors of many Lutherans, were Slavic people who settled in what is now eastern Germany. During the Reformation, many became Lutherans, accepting a faith based on Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions. When the regional governments formed state churches, this faith was threatened. Lutheran churches were merged with Reformed churches and forced to incorporate vague, or conflicting religious beliefs. Pastors were jailed and parishioners fined for failure to obey, and monetary support was withheld. The political and economic oppression, and danger of a compromised faith, ultimately threatened the Wendish people - their culture and language - with extinction. In the 1850's, they came to America seeking freedom of religion and lifestyle. Through suffering and hard work, they established a settlement in Serbin, Texas, and a church - St. Paul's Lutheran. But, there were rules to be followed: government rules for civil matters, guidelines as the first Texas church to join the Missouri Synod, and rules established for the good of their congregation. According to Nielsen's book, in 1866, the Wends adopted "proper Lutheran church decorum" rules - "instead of excluding the guests." They included items such as, "It is: forbidden for men to wear hats during worship or carry six-shooters into the church building, not permissible to smoke a pipe or chew tobacco in the church building nor for anyone to leave during worship," and "not permissible to speak aloud in or near the church while services are being held nor to laugh in church." To me, they read as rules meant, at that time, to ensure a meaningful worship for all - for the collective good. The haircut, our church worship, the Wends - it seems that with all freedoms come responsibilities. I suppose it all began with a tree. "Now the Lord God had planted a garden in the east, in Eden" (Gen. 2:8). Man was free to live in joy and peace, with God, in His beautiful Creation, but the freedom came with responsibility. God said, "You are free to eat from any tree in the garden; but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil" (Gen. 2:16,17). Man chose to use his freedom irresponsibly and disobeyed, resulting in separation from God, and loss of freedom from sin and death. But God had a plan, and it involved another tree. We "were redeemed [ransomed] . . . with the precious blood of Christ" (1 Pt. 1:18,19). Jesus died on a tree to give us life free from the threat of sin and death, and to reunite us with God. With this freedom, He exhorts us to "Live as free men, show proper respect to everyone, serve others, and above all, love each other deeply" (1 Pt. 2:16,17 & 4:8,10). He wants us to "Be holy" - as Jesus showed us how to live, and He gives us guidelines in His commandments and throughout Scripture. In faith, and in love for my Savior, I will strive to follow God's commands even as I observe earthly rules established for the collective good. I know I live free to lawfully voice my opinion when I see injustice, and frankly, it's not just about me. It's about all of us. God is Good. He is in control. Thanks be to our loving God! Joyfully free in Christ! Duannah

Cooking With Eunice

Patty Pan Cake - a delicious way to use up overgrown late squash from your garden. Patty pans (white round scalloped squash), with their mild taste & firm flesh, make the best cake - sort of a mock apple cake (or use patty pans to make a mock apple pie!). May use pears. apples, carrots, etc., instead of squash.

3 cups diced Patty Pan squash (if large squash, peel & remove seeds)

2 cups flour

1/2 tsp baking powder

1/2 tsp baking soda

1/2 tsp salt

1 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp dried orange peel (optional)

2 cups sugar

3 eggs

3/4 cup canola oil

1 tsp vanilla

1 cup raisins

1 cup chopped pecans, toasted a bit

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a 9X13 baking dish. In medium mixing bowl, whisk together flour, & next 5 dry ingredients. In large mixing bowl, cream sugar & eggs. Mix in oil & vanilla. Stir the dry ingredients into the wet. Stir in the patty pan, raisins & pecans. Pour into prepared baking dish. Bake for 35 - 40 minutes. A sharp knife inserted into cake should pull out clean. Cool cake on a rack. Store well covered. (Or, bake in a lightly greased Bundt pan for 50 to 60 minutes.)

In a glass 2 cup lcing (optional): measuring cup, melt 1 Tbsp. butter with 1 Tbsp. water, in microwave. With fork or small whisk, stir in 1 cup powdered sugar & a small pinch of salt. Add 1/4 tsp. vanilla. Add warm water, 1 tsp. at a time, until desired drizzle consistency. Drizzle over the cooled cake.

Guidelines for In-Person Worship at Christ

We ask all those who plan to attend the worship service or discipleship class to:

- 4 Avoid all handshaking, hugging, or touching of any kind with those outside their family.
- Bring a mask and wear it at all times within our facilities (except when receiving the Lord's Supper).
- → Maintain social distancing at all times while entering/ exiting/attending our worship and/or discipleship class.
- Please do not touch/handle/use any of the hymnals for any purpose (hymns/liturgies will be printed in the bulletin).
- † Please wash and/or sanitize your hands often while in attendance at Christ (i.e. entering the sanctuary, prior to Holy Communion, leaving the sanctuary).
- † Please do not gather in the narthex, sanctuary, or hall-ways to talk before or after worship.
- Please wait for your row to be dismissed at the end of worship and proceed to exit the building (unless you are attending the discipleship study or using the restroom).
- † Please do not attend worship if you have any signs of illness (i.e. elevated temperature, sore throat, coughing, body aches, etc).
- ⊕ Err on the side of caution be respectful of others' fears and precautions
- † Come prepared to praise and thank God for bringing us back together, and continue to ask God to protect us as we once again gather for worship.
