# **Eunice Guild**

St. Paul says in 2 Tim. 1:5, that Eunice, the mother of Timothy, was a woman of "sincere faith." She loved her Lord and Savior, and she lived her faith. It is our prayer that we may all be granted this same sincere faith. God be with you and bless you as you spend time in Meditation and in Cooking With Eunice.

Beginning in 2015, I went through over a year of intense specialized therapy. I was blessed to have an extraordinary occupational therapist who showed me how to live - not with limitations, but in spite of them. Shortly after his high school graduation, he was in an automobile accident which left him paralyzed from just above the waist down. He sat in a wheelchair, powered only by his strong arms. The gym where we worked was surrounded by busy streets with few parking spaces, and even fewer handicap accessible for the modified vehicle he drove. One day, I saw him flying down the sidewalk in his chair (he was a few minutes late). Around the corner he sped perfectly in control, across the parking lot, and through the automatic doors into the building. So, during our session, I asked him why he did not have an assigned close and safe parking space. He answered, "Those should be kept for people who really need them!" That's the kind of guy he was. He was also a very happy dad and husband as "cellphone picture time" proved. He told me his little girl was a strong and accomplished swimmer, but grinning, he said he had a bit more training to do. He had noticed something funny about the way she swam in their pool, and watching more closely, he realized she was swimming by using only her arms - no leg paddling! Daddy was her example. She watched and wanted to be like him! Over our months together, he became an example to me also. You see, he lived his life not as a slave to his disabilities, but as a person freed to the potentials of his abilities. In this respect, I desired to be more like him. In the August 2020 "Lutheran Witness," there is an article titled "Social Media Politics, Speaking as A Christian In the Chaos," written by Peter Slayton, the LCMS social media manager. There were a few lines that gave me pause - well, they brought me to a screeching halt! See what you think: "Who am I? I am a Christian - a little Christ." WOW! "A little Christ?" I guess I never really thought of myself that way. The writer finishes his thought with, "Baptized, justified, sanctified and awaiting His return, I am Christ's own. That's who I am." "A little Christ" is not about what I do, but rather about what Christ has done for, and in, me! It's ALL about His suffering, death and resurrection - His great LOVE. Paul told the Corinthians, "The Lord Almighty says, 'I will be a Father to you, and you will be my sons and daughters' " (2 Cor 6:18). Through the Water and Word of Baptism, God is my Father, and in love, I do want to be like Him. So, how do I do that? Through faith by the power of the Holy Spirit! And, I have the most amazing Example to follow! At Jesus' Last Supper with His disciples, He told them, "I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you" (John 13:15). He also said, "Anyone who has seen Me has seen the Father" (John 14:9). If I want an example of how to be "a little Christ," I only need delve into God's Word to see my Savior's life of humility, service, and great love for others. Truthfully, those qualities are not always easy, especially in troubling times, but I think that's when it's most important to strive to live as "a little Christ." It is then that others - the world - are more likely to watch how Christians react. What contentment, joy and hope does our God have to offer? How great is He really? Oh, my! What amazingly wonderful things about my Savior there are to share with others! And prayerfully, my life can be an example! Everything I do and say is a reflection of who I am, and knowing this, I loudly proclaim, "Who am I? I am a Christian - a little Christ!!" With Joy in Christ! Duannah

#### SAUERKRAUT CORN RELISH

The taste of this simple, simple relish is AMAZING! Serve it on hot dogs or at your next bar-b-que. It's a topping, or even a side, that goes great with almost anything! My sweet sister, Yvette, adapted this winning recipe from the Texas Co-op Power magazine to reflect our family's favorite tastes, and recommended including it in this month's newsletter. You will thank her for this one!

1 can (14.5 oz) sauerkraut
2/3 cup sugar
1/2 cup vegetable oil
1/4 cup apple cider vinegar
1/2 tsp. celery seeds
1 can (15.25 oz) whole kernel corn, drained
1/3 cup chopped red and/or green bell pepper
2 Tbsp. chopped onion
1 tsp. diced fresh jalapeno, or to taste (optional)
1/2 tsp. each of salt and pepper, or to taste

Drain sauerkraut well, pressing out all excess liquid. Whisk together sugar, oil, vinegar, and celery seeds until sugar is dissolved. Stir in remaining ingredients except for the salt and pepper, and mix well. Add salt and pepper to taste. Cover and chill for at least 8 hours for best taste. Makes 2 pints.

#### **Guidelines for In-Person Worship at Christ**

We ask all those who plan to attend the worship service or discipleship class to:

- Avoid all handshaking, hugging, or touching of any kind with those outside their family.
- Bring a mask and wear it at all times within our facilities (except when receiving the Lord's Supper).
- † Maintain social distancing at all times while entering/ exiting/attending our worship and/or discipleship class.
- † Please do not touch/handle/use any of the hymnals for any purpose (hymns/liturgies will be printed in the bulletin).
- † Please wash and/or sanitize your hands often while in attendance at Christ (i.e. entering the sanctuary, prior to Holy Communion, leaving the sanctuary).
- † Please do not gather in the narthex, sanctuary, or hallways to talk before or after worship.
- Please wait for your row to be dismissed at the end of worship and proceed to exit the building (unless you are attending the discipleship study or using the restroom).
- Please do not attend worship if you have any signs of illness (i.e. elevated temperature, sore throat, coughing, body aches, etc).
- ⊕ Err on the side of caution be respectful of others' fears and precautions
- † Come prepared to praise and thank God for bringing us back together, and continue to ask God to protect us as we once again gather for worship.
