"I will meditate"

"SILENT NIGHT?"

"Silent night, holy night! All is calm, all is bright." O! The opening words to such a beautiful Christmas carol! I love singing it by candlelight with my church family at the end of our Christmas Eve service. It's a moment when all my pains and fears seem to dissolve, and the world's turmoil quiets. It was a young Catholic priest, Joseph Mohr, who in 1816 Austria wrote the poem that became this beloved Christmas carol. Two years later, on Christmas Eve, he needed a carol for Midnight Mass, and took the poem to his friend, Franz Gruber, to hurriedly write a melody for it. Franz, a school teacher and organist, wrote the simple lullaby for guitar and choir. I wonder why Mohr wrote of a silent and calm night. St. Luke's account of Jesus' birth (Chapter 2:1-20) reads a bit noisy, hectic, and worrisome. Bethlehem was probably bustling with travelers in town for the Roman Empire's census. As his ancestral town, Joseph had traveled there to register with his betrothed, a very pregnant Mary, but they found no accommodations. "There was no room for them in the inn" (Luke 2:7). They found shelter in a nearby animal enclosure where Mary gave birth to Jesus and "placed Him in a manger" (vs7), a feeding trough. Shepherds were "living out in the fields nearby" (vs8) staying awake through the night to watch their flocks when "an angel of the Lord appeared" and "they were terrified!" (vs9). And when the angel announced, "Today . . . a Savior has been born to you; He is Christ the Lord" (vs11), "suddenly, a great company of the heavenly host appeared . . . praising God!" (vs13). Then the shepherds "hurried off" to see the child and to spread the good news! (vs16, 17)! A crowded town, animals, pregnancy and birth, guarding sheep, a host of angels – all come with "noise." Yet, each time I read Luke 2, I sense only a peace-filled silence and calm. I know it was a "Holy Night" as everything occurred according to God's will, but why a "Silent Night"? Our Lutheran Service Book includes three verses of "Silent Night, Holy Night" (#363) in German as Mohr wrote them. (The traditional English version we sing is a translation written in 1863, by John Young, an Episcopal priest.) The literal translation of Mohr's poem is: "Silent night, holy night! All is sleeping. Alone watching, only the close, most holy couple. Blessed boy in curly hair, sleep in Heavenly Peace! ²Silent night, holy night! Shepherds just informed by the angels' hallelujah, it rings out far and wide: Christ the Savior is here! ³Silent night, holy night! Son of God, oh how laughs Love out of your divine mouth, for now the salvation strikes for us, Christ in Thy birth!" (german-way.com). Beautiful. When I read, or hear Luke 2, my pains and fears dissolve, the world's turmoil quiets, and the silence and calm of the holy night ring out loud and clear. And, there is a brightness, a light dispelling all darkness. It is the Love of God, manifest in His only begotten Son, who left the glory of Heaven to do the work His Father gave Him to do. And, He completed it on a cross where He silenced the penalty of sin forever, for all believers! "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him 'Immanuel' - which means 'God with us'" (Matt 1:23). "Give Him the name Jesus, because He will save His people from their sins" (Matt 1:21). And Jesus said, I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life!" (Jn 8:12). A "Silent Night"? Yes, Mohr was right. It was a silence heard throughout Creation, and for all time. Because of the Child in the manger - our Savior - and by God's Grace, through faith, we live in peace with God the Father now and eternally! May we be filled with this true PEACE - "Heavenly Peace," and the JOY it brings, this Christmas and forever!

Cranberry Cheesecake Rollups

Easy, quick, and perfect for a holiday table!

4 oz. cream cheese, room temperature

1/4 cup powdered sugar

½ cup cranberry sauce

1 pkg. crescent rolls (8 count)

1 Tbsp. butter, melted

2 Tbsp. granulated sugar

Preheat oven to 375°. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. In a bowl, stir together cream cheese and powdered sugar until smooth. Fold in cranberry sauce. Unroll crescent dough and separate into triangles. Spread thin layer of the cream cheese mixture onto each triangle. Roll it up, beginning with the wide end, and place onto baking sheet. Brush each roll with melted butter and sprinkle with granulated sugar. Bake 9 – 12 minutes until rolls are golden brown.
