

THE END?

My brother and I watched a favorite gangster movie the other night, "White Heat." We've seen it so many times, but this time there was one scene that caught my attention. Cody Jarrett, a psychopathic criminal played by James Cagney, and his gang are standing next to an empty 5,000-gallon gas truck as he explains his plans to rob the payroll of a large refinery. He tells them, "Ma told me when I was a kid, a story about a horse. Way back, there was a whole army trying to knock over a place called Troy. And gettin' nowhere fast, couldn't even put a dent in the wall. And one mornin' the people of Troy wake up and look over the wall and the entire army had disappeared - men, boats, the works - taken a powder. But they left one thing after them, a great big wooden horse. Accordin' to Ma . . . ". That's it! The movie goes to the next scene, and Jarrett never finishes the story for the audience! Well, I've never been one to need "closure," but leaving a story half-told makes my toes curl. I may know the ending, but for some reason I've got to hear it to be freed from anticipation. Strangely, thinking about this took me to thoughts of Easter. It seems only yesterday I prayerfully awaited the Savior's birth, worshipped Him with shepherds and Magi, and prayed "Amen. Come Lord Jesus." Only yesterday I whispered my repentant prayers of Lent, watched Jesus die on a cross, and have shouted "Christ is Risen, Indeed!" with "Alleluias!" And . . . my toes are curling. A good friend and I talked often of memories of growing up Lutheran and attending church services on Ascension Day, and how we missed that. It was good to sing more "Alleluias" and observe the day our risen Savior was taken up into Heaven. Thirty-nine days after His resurrection day, Jesus and His apostles gathered on the Mount of Olives, and "He was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid Him from their sight" (Acts 1:9). The apostles "were looking intently up into the sky as He was going, when suddenly two men dressed in white stood beside them." They said, "This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen Him go into heaven" (Acts 1:10, 11). The End. Or, was it? There was no "good-bye" from Jesus. Instead, He promised, "I am with you always" (Matt 28:19), and "I will come back and take you to be with me" (John 14:3). At Christ's Ascension, He was exalted to His position on the throne of God with "all authority in heaven and on earth" (Matt 28:18). But He is not apart from us. He took His place as the Head of His Church, the assembly of believers, where He is fully present and active. Ten days after His ascension (Pentecost), He sent His Holy Spirit to be with us as He promised, to bring us to faith and keep us in faith. He is fully present in His Word, and His true body and blood are present in the bread and wine of Holy Communion. He is our advocate on God's throne, and He blesses us with gifts of forgiveness and life eternal even as He prepares a place for us in heaven. And, just as He ascended true God and true Man, He will return. This is the Unfailing Love of our Christ, since before creation, today and forever! He is never apart from us. No matter what we go through in life, He is by our side, fully attentive. My toes are uncurled! My anticipation is HOPE fulfilled! By faith, I am His -FOREVER! The End! (And, I so look forward to the sequel - "Amen! Come, Lord Jesus!" - the Savior's return to take me home to heaven!) "Be now our joy on earth, O Lord, and be our future great reward. BUSY DAY CAKE

This delicious and simple cake recipe is from a dear friend and past member of our church, Sophie Werchan. It's a "go-to" recipe as it uses ingredients most always in our pantries. I've added the "Optional" which makes a bit more crumb topping.

2 cups flour

1 ¹/₂ cups sugar

2 tsp baking powder

2/3 cup oleo, cold

2 eggs

³/₄ cup milk

1 tsp vanilla

Preheat oven to 350°. Combine flour, sugar and baking powder. Cut in oleo to form rough crumb. Set aside ½ cup of this mixture. Add the eggs, milk and vanilla to the remaining mixture. Pour into a buttered (or use spray oil) 9X13 baking pan. Sprinkle with reserved half cup of crumbed mixture. Bake 35 to 40 minutes.

Variation: Cover batter with peach slices, blueberries, apples, etc. Sprinkle with the ½ cup crumb mixture, and bake.

Optional: To reserved $\frac{1}{2}$ cup crumb mixture, stir in $\frac{1}{2}$ c graham cracker crumbs, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp cinnamon, and 1 Tbsp. sugar. Cut in 1 Tbsp oleo. Sprinkle about $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of this onto top of cake. Add fruit and cover with remaining crumbs. Bake and enjoy!
