

St. Paul says in 2 Tim. 1:5, that Eunice, the mother of Timothy, was a woman of "sincere faith." She loved her Lord and Savior, and she lived her faith. It is our prayer that we may all be granted this same sincere faith.

God be with you and bless you as you spend time in Meditation and in Cooking With Eunice.

#### Meditation

#### "Chosen"

One Sunday before worship, I noticed anew, the little diamond-shaped windows set into the north wall of our sanctuary. Their richly colored glass blocks were unusually illuminated by the morning sun, beautifully highlighting striking black outlines of symbols. They are symbols which represent the twelve disciples chosen by Jesus to be His Apostles. Peter's symbol in the window nearest the altar, is keys on an inverted cross. Jesus said to him, "I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven" (Matt. 16:19). It is thought he died by crucifixion on an inverted cross. Next is Matthew who was a tax collector. His symbol is three money bags. The next symbol, a serpent in a chalice, is John's. Legend tells of an attempt to poison John with communion wine. He blessed it, and the poison came out as a snake. Andrew is depicted in the next window by an X-shaped cross, the type used to crucify him. He brought his brother Simon (Peter) to Jesus, saying: "We have found the Messiah" (John 1:41). Two loaves of bread and a cross, symbolize Philip in the next window. He told Jesus, "Eight months wages would not buy enough bread" (John 6:7), to feed the 5,000. He may have been crucified. Bartholomew, faithful to God's Word, is depicted by a knife over a Bible. A peaceful man, it is said he was skinned to death by flaying with knives. Next is James, who was preparing nets in a boat with his brother John when Jesus called them. He traveled far preaching the Gospel, and his symbol is three shells, often used to scoop drinking water. He was the first to be martyred when Herod ordered his death. Thomas' symbol is a carpenter's square and a spear. It is thought he built a church in India, and was killed there by a spear. A saw is easy to spot in the next window. It depicts James the Minor who was martyred and his body sawed to pieces. Next, Jude, sometimes called Thaddeus, is depicted by a ship because he traveled far on missionary voyages. A fish on a Bible symbolizes Simon the Zealot as a "fisher of men." The window furthest to the back, is that of Judas Iscariot, symbolized by a money bag and coins. This window is included to remind us all of our human weakness and our need for God's forgiveness. These are the twelve ordinary, sinful men - fisherman, tax collector, carpenter, etc. - chosen by Jesus to enter into a closer relationship with Him and commissioned for an extraordinary purpose - to be His Apostles. By the power of the Holy Spirit, they established His church on earth, spreading the Gospel by believing and testifying to what they had learned and witnessed in Jesus - the redemptive power in His life, death and resurrection! The Apostle Peter, devoted to Jesus and a courageous and bold preacher, said, "You are a chosen people, a royal priesthood . . . belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His wonderful light!" (1 Peter 2:9). This is us!! Luther said, "Faith alone is the true priestly office." "We must . . . believe that we receive everything from Him and that He is our God. Then out with it, and freely and openly confess this before the world - preach, praise, glorify and give thanks! This is the real and only worship of God." Look upon the Windows of the Apostles as examples of Christian character of life lived in Christian faith. Read and study the lives of the Apostles in the Gospels as they walked with Jesus, and then after the first Easter and to their deaths, continued to share the Good News of forgiveness through faith! And learn, because Jesus has also chosen us - ordinary, sinful people - to enter into a close relationship with Him, and He commissions us for an extraordinary purpose to boldly, by lives of service and love, with praise and thanksgiving, believe and testify to forgiveness and Salvation freely received through faith in Jesus Christ our Lord! # ROULADEN

Thank you to Mildred Westfall for this delicious German recipe!

2 1/2 lbs. lean beef round steaks (look for thin sliced)

8 Tablespoon yellow mustard

salt and pepper to taste

4 slices bacon (chopped)

1/2 cup onion (chopped)

1/4 cup dill pickle, finely chopped (may use drained dill relish)

1/4 cup oil for frying

3 1/2 cups hot water to cover (or hot beef broth)

1 bay leaf

1/3 cup flour

1/4 cup fresh parsley minced

#### TO MAKE GRAVY

Add the flour to 1 cup of water in a large measuring cup, whisking briskly with a fork to blend. Pour the flour mixture all at once into the hot broth, using a wire whisk to blend. Use a wooden spoon to scrape up any brown bits from the bottom of the pan, and stir them into the gravy. Increase heat to medium-high and bring gravy mixture to a boil, stirring constantly. Continue to whisk while boiling for two to three minutes, until gravy thickens. Reduce heat to low and remove the bay leaf. Adjust seasoning to taste. Return rouladen to gravy, or spoon gravy over rouladen to serve.

Cut meat into about 8 steaks and pound thin (about 4X6 inches and 1/4-inch thick). Spread 1 tablespoon mustard evenly on one side of each pounded steak. Sprinkle salt and pepper over mustard. Evenly sprinkle chopped bacon, onion and pickles over mustard side of each steak. Roll up firmly, jelly roll fashion (with filling to inside, starting at narrow end) and secure each roulade shut (so filling stays in) with wooden toothpicks, cooking twine or white sewing thread. In a large Dutch oven, heat the cooking oil over medium-high heat. When hot, carefully add the rouladen. Fry until nicely browned, turning once (about 7 minutes each side). Add enough hot water or broth (may add red wine) to almost cover the rouladen. Add bay leaf. Increase heat to high and bring to a boil. Cover and reduce heat to low. Simmer covered for 1 1/2 hours on low heat. Check about halfway through cooking time, add hot water as needed to cover meat, stir, replace lid and finish cooking. With a large slotted spoon carefully remove the rouladen from the hot broth to an oven proof dish, cover

In a time of less volunteerism due to Covid-19 and such, the online giving is less cumbersome and more streamlined for our Financial Secretary to manage.
