Meditation —

"The OLD, OLD, STORY"

"Listen, and I will tell you; God help both you and me, And make 'the old, old story' *His Message* unto thee! [He] should be son of Adam, But Son of God as well, And bring a full salvation From sin and death and hell. He lived a life most holy; His every thought was love, And every action showed it, To man, and God above." These beautiful words are selected verses from a poem by Katherine (Kate) Hankey. She was born in London in 1834 to wealthy prominent parents who belonged to the more evangelical sect of the Anglican Church. In her late teens, she began to write books and poetry of faith, giving the money from the sale of her writings to mission projects. She also began organizing and teaching Sunday School classes to children, rich and poor. When she was 30 years old, she became seriously ill, and during the long recovery, she wrote two lengthy poems on the life of Christ. In the first poem, "The Story Wanted," written in January 1866, she longs for the comfort found in Christ's story. Stanzas begin with these lines: "Tell me the story simply;" "Tell me the story slowly;" "Tell me the story often;" "Tell me the story softly;" "Tell me the story always;" "Tell me the same old story." In the second poem, a sequel to the first entitled "The Story Told" and written in November 1866, she does that very thing, telling the story simply - and beautifully. One of my favorite hymns, an old gospel song, "I Love to Tell the Story," was taken from Kate's poems. And, I do so love to "tell the Story." Unfortunately, there have been many times when I was given wonderful opportunities to witness to my faith, and instead I tried to be witty, or, I kept silent. As I get older, I find it easier to "tell The Story," but many times, I feel inadequate in knowing what to say. In Matthew's account of the Gospel, he writes about how Jesus "sent out" the twelve Disciples with instructions. My NIV Bible does not indicate Jesus said, "Tell My Story," but He did say, "As you go, preach this message: 'The Kingdom of heaven is near'" (Matt. 10:7). That is exactly what Mark's Gospel account says Jesus did: "Jesus went into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. 'The time has come,' He said. 'The kingdom of God is near. Repent and believe the good news!'" (Mark 1:14-15). And, St. Paul explained exactly what that "good news" - the Gospel, *Jesus' Message* to all people - exactly what that is: "Now, brothers, I want to remind you of the gospel. By this gospel you are saved: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that He was buried, that He was raised on the third day" (1 Cor. 15:1-4). Jesus wants us to simply tell others about Him and what He has done for us. It is the Creed we speak together each Sunday in worship. It is Christ's Story, *His Message*! We can leave the expounding and teaching of His Word to those He has called and trained. All we need do is tell the Story of the true and only Savior - that same old, beautiful, comforting story: Jesus was born, He lived and died and was raised to live again - for us! And that in this faith, we are freed from the curse of sin and death to love and live as Jesus did. Ash Wednesday is March 2nd, and the penitential season of Lent begins. Using several verses of Kate's poem in preparation for Lent, I would so love to tell you part of an old, old story, of "Jesus and His Love": "This gentle, holy Jesus Without a spot or stain, By wicked hands was taken, And crucified, and slain! Look! Look! If you can bear it - Look at your dying Lord! Stand near the cross and watch Him: 'Behold the Lamb of God!' Let everybody see it, That Christ has made you free; And if it sets them longing, Say, 'Jesus died for thee!'" *Lenten Blessings, Duannah*

Southern Shrimp Gumbo

This recipe is off The Country Cook website. It's really good, and although it takes a little time to properly prepare, it is worth every minute! Any leftovers can be frozen.

1/4 cup butter	1/2 cup canola oil	1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1 large sweet onion, chopped	1 green bell pepper, chopped	2 celery ribs, chopped
3 cloves garlic, minced	2 bay leaves	14.5 oz. can fire-roasted tomatoes
6 cups seafood stock, divided	1 tsp. black pepper	1/2 tsp. kosher salt
1 Tbsp. low salt creole seasoning	1 link andouille sausage, sliced thin	1 link smoked sausage, sliced thin
1 cup fresh okra, chopped	1 tsp. liquid shrimp and crab boil	2 lbs. shrimp, peeled and deveined
3 green onions, chopped		

Melt butter and 1/4 cup canola oil in a large pot, add flour and whisk continuously over low to medium heat until the mixture (the roux) has turned to a light chocolate color. This will take time. Don't rush it and do not turn the heat to high. Add the chopped onion, bell pepper and celery and continue to cook, stirring for about 10 minutes. Add the chopped garlic, stir for two more minutes. Add the canned tomatoes, half of the seafood stock, the bay leaves and the seasoning. Stir well and cover. Allow to gently simmer. In a large skillet (12") add 2 Tbsps. canola oil and the okra (add okra while oil is cool). Turn heat to medium, then add the sausage. Cook stirring often for about 15 minutes or until sausage is a bit browned, and okra is soft. Pour the remaining stock into the skillet and scrape up the stuck bits which add good flavor. Add these contents to the pot, stir and bring to a boil. Cover and simmer for about 45 - 60 minutes. Meanwhile, in a bowl, add the liquid shrimp and crab boil to the fresh shrimp and stir to coat. Cover and place in refrigerator. 10 minutes before you're ready to eat, add shrimp to the gumbo, stir, cover and cook on low for 10 minutes. Remove bay leaves. Add green onions. Serve over cooked rice.

If you do not like seafood, leave the shrimp out, or substitute chicken. For added flavor, we fried 2 slices chopped thick sliced bacon in 1 Tbsp. canola oil until crisp and added all to the pot with the vegetables.

Online Giving - A word of thanks to all of you for your continued support of our ministry here at Christ Lutheran Church, and a special note of thanks to all of you who have chosen to give online through our website with the Vanco portal. In a time of less volunteerism due to Covid-19 and such, the online giving is less cumbersome and more streamlined for our Financial Secretary to manage.
