

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Because some of you don't have access to the emails we send out, I am including this letter in our August newsletter also. For many of you this will be repeat information, but I wanted to make sure this news was sent out to everyone in our church family.

I would have rather told you this in person, but I am still coming to terms with it myself, and I am still having a hard time talking about it. For the last couple of years my blood work at my yearly physicals has shown me to be somewhat anemic. This year things progressed. After a number of tests, my doctor called me at 8:24pm on June 27 and told me that I have chronic lymphocytic leukemia. As I have come to understand it, it is not a curable disease, but it is a treatable disease. I saw my oncologist on Tuesday of this past week, and he was hopeful. I am in the early stages of the disease it appears, and it is generally a slow progressing disease, so I will not be doing any treatments quite yet. Unlike other cancers in which early detection helps with early treatment, this one is not usually treated until more symptoms start appearing. By God's grace I am not at that stage yet.

I had a family meeting with my girls a couple of weeks ago to let them know. That was a very hard night with many tears. Though I am very saddened by the thoughts of my life not being near as long as I had hoped and planned and saved for, I am hopeful that God will still grant me many more years of quality life with my family and still in ministry also. I do not have any plans of retiring early as of this moment, but that could certainly change if my health status changes.

I find myself in a very strange place spiritually, wanting to thank God for every moment and every day that I have, and yet not wanting to think about this disease and what it will probably eventually do to me. When I think about it, I get anxious, and that anxiousness I can physically feel in my chest. So, I don't want to dwell upon it... but I also don't want to take even one moment for granted, for I know that every moment of feeling good is a gift from God.

Apparently, this is a common disease among older adults, especially older white males, but I am on the younger side of those who get it. The doctor said that this is a cancer that much research is being done on, and one which they are continuing to find new ways to treat, and thus the longer I can stave off the growth of the disease the better. But of course, there is nothing I can do to do that. All of that is completely in God's hands. And so, I pray, and I trust, and I hope, and I do my best to walk by faith and not by sight. I firmly believe that God can still divide waters and slay giants, and thus I am praying that He will slay this giant that stands before me and provide a way through this disease for me to still give me many more years of life and service in this world. As I said in my message on Sunday, God's grace is sufficient for us. Believing that, I know His grace will get me, and my family, and our church family through this regardless of how it all turns out.

I am sorry to drop this bomb on all of you. I know you all have your own struggles and challenges before you. I do ask that you keep me in your prayers. I believe that God answers prayers, and I also believe that God keeps His promises, and He has promised that when we call upon Him in our day of trouble that He will answer. I don't know what that answer will be for me, but I do know that whatever it is it will be aimed at working good for me even amid this difficult situation and that His grace will somehow be sufficient for me.

Thanks for listening, and thank you in advance for your prayers. God be with you all and keep you in His care. Yours in Christ, pastor john

MORNING BY MORNING

My husband, Bill, and I would have celebrated our 50th wedding anniversary this August 11th, if he had not died. O! We would have fun! Knowing him, we'd climb into our truck with a few changes of clothes and a map, and head wherever we wanted – ROAD TRIP! – our favorite thing to do. One time, we headed north from Austin with a couple of "emergency" changes of clothes - "just for the day." In Nebraska, I asked Bill how much farther we were going, and he grinned. I grabbed our phone and cancelled several upcoming appointments. When we reached a Canadian port of entry in North Dakota, we finally decided to turn and head home. Fun! There were worries on our hundreds of road trips: automotive problems with tires, transmission, broken windshield, etc., often with financial shortages; road work and detours; bad weather; illness, migraines, an infected tooth; and even law enforcement stops for broken taillights, and suspicious activity! We got through it all but not always when, where, or how we wanted. But things always "worked out." Thinking back over the 44 years we were married and the six years since Bill's death, life moved along a lot like our road trips. There were dreams, plans, a direction to head, goals to achieve - and fun! And detours, troubles, pain and illness, loss and fear - and tears. But as I went through it all, there was always this truth: God provides. I guess many would say, "That's just life! Sometimes you're lucky, sometimes you're not." But for me, I know with more and more certainty, in ALL things, God provides. I see His love in the sunrise and changing seasons, in clean water from a faucet and cool air from a vent, and in an HEB delivery driver. Even when things seem all wrong and hopeless, God is with me, caring for me out of great compassion. I was hospitalized, unable to move my limbs, and I regained much with advanced therapy. I was unconscious with a massive infection, and I survived by a surgeon's steady hands. I was told my husband had been found dead, and I've lived a good life even without him, through the overwhelming love of family. From the routine to the extraordinary, God's mercies, the goodness and blessings that flow out of His love, never stop! The prophet Jeremiah experienced the horrible suffering and death of his people, the Jews, at the hands of invading Babylonians, and he wrote these words of encouragement: "But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope; the steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness. 'The Lord is my portion,' says my soul, therefore I will hope in Him." (Lam 3:21-24). Like Jeremiah and the Jews, we are sinners, undeserving of God's favors, and, we share the same hope, the Messiah! We see God's unceasing mercy in the forgiveness of our sins, bought by the suffering and death of His only Son, Jesus. By faith, we now live in peace with God, and in the resurrection of Christ, we will live with Him forever. So great is our God and His Love! And, His love is unwavering. He remains faithful, and nothing can separate us, God's children, from Him, not even death! God provides, but in sin and weakness, I do often struggle to find displays of His providing care anywhere. That's when I try to remember to be still, and to pray. As I pray, Christ's Spirit strengthens my faith, reminding me of God's compassion - and I am renewed. In the beautiful words of the hymn, Great is Thy Faithfulness (LSB 809), the author writes, "Morning by morning new mercies I see. Strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow. Great is Thy faithfulness, Lord unto me." There is a truth, a promise I know with all certainty and hope: God, in His great and never-ending love, provides. In Christ, He always has, He always will.
