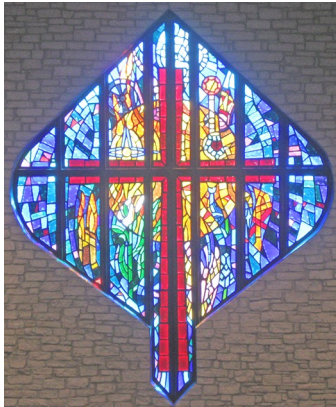

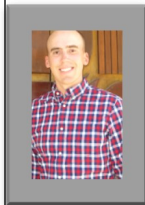

HOLY CROSS

When Grandpa Twenhafel died, our grandmother told 17-year-old me that I would be the organist for his funeral. I began playing piano when I was four, and all through high school, I had made a little money rehearsing and accompanying other students at concerts, contests, etc. I was also comfortable playing organ, but, I had never played for a church service, so I was quite nervous about the funeral. I suppose I did alright, but I don't really remember much. What mostly stands out, was the solo selected by Grandma, “The Old Rugged Cross.” It sounded great! And I was sure I played a major role in that! Truthfully, the soloist, a man from our church, did not need accompaniment, he had such a full, beautiful voice! But ever since, when I hear that wonderful song, “The Old Rugged Cross,” I am carried back to that day on the organ bench. I've worn crosses on a chain around my neck for many years. Most are sterling silver, shiny, and decoratively etched, and there's one sweet wooden cross made by a beloved church family member. Songs and thoughts of crosses fill my head right now because my sister suggested I meditate about Holy Cross Day, September 14th. Um, Holy Cross Day? Did I know about this? Well, it's in my Lutheran hymnal's list of Feasts and Festivals (*LSB* pg xi)! So, what am I to think and pray about on that day? I had some ideas but they all seemed to overlap with other church year observances, in particular, Good Friday. So, I began by reading the lectionary (*LSB* pg xxiii). From the Old Testament reading: “The Lord said to Moses, ‘Make a snake and put it on a pole; anyone who is bitten can look at it and live. So Moses made a bronze snake and put it on a pole. Then when anyone was bitten by a snake and looked at the bronze snake, he lived’” (Num 21:4-9). Why is this a reading for that day? Well, the Israelites were wandering in the wilderness after their exodus from Egypt. When they complained to God and Moses about what they had to eat, God sent poisonous snakes which bit and killed many of them. When they repented and asked God to take away the snakes, He provided a way for them to be saved from the lethal venom. Wow! I see a parallel, and a reason for this reading. Here, some 900 years prior to the first recorded crucifixion, God showed His chosen instrument upon which our salvation would be won! His Son, being without sin, would carry the poison of all sin and be lifted up on a CROSS to die our punishment, and to save us! This is the promise God made in the Garden of Eden, His plan to defeat Satan! And, it wasn't the pole or the bronze snake that saved the Israelites from the lethal venom. It was their faith. They had to look up to and believe in God's means of salvation! And so do we! Jesus said, “Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the desert, so the Son of Man must be lifted up, that everyone who believes in Him may have eternal life” (John 3:14-15). But how can a cruel, humiliating manner of death ever be “HOLY”? It is Holy because God chose it, and by what God worked through it to His glory. It is Holy by the Christ Who died there. It is Holy because when we look upon it in faith, and by grace, we see our Savior! Jesus said, “But I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all men to myself” (John 12:32). In our Baptism, our sinful self died on that cross with Jesus, and we can sing with Moses, “He has become my salvation!” (Ex 15:2). And so, “I'll cherish the old rugged cross, till my trophies at last I lay down; I will cling to the old rugged cross, and exchange it some day for a crown.” A very blessed Holy Cross Day. OREO COOKIE DELIGHT (no cooking!)

1 package (14.3 oz) regular Oreo Cookies
 6 Tbsp butter, melted
 1 block (8 oz) cream cheese, room temp.
 1 cup powdered sugar
 2 containers (8 oz) Cool Whip, thawed
 1 package (5.9 oz) instant chocolate pudding mix
 2 ¾ cup milk

Crush bag of Oreos in a food processor, or by putting cookies in a zip-top bag and beating with a rolling pin, etc. Set aside 1 cup. Mix remaining crumbs with melted butter. Press into a 9X13 pan. Beat cream cheese with mixer until smooth. Add powdered sugar and mix well. Fold in 1 container Cool Whip. Spread over the Oreo crust. Mix pudding mix and milk with a whisk, and let thicken. Spread over the cream cheese layer. Top with remaining container Cool Whip. Sprinkle on the 1 cup Oreo crumbs. Chill at least 4 hours. ENJOY!

Online Giving -- A word of thanks to all of you for your continued support of our ministry here at Christ Lutheran Church, and a special note of thanks to all of you who have chosen to give online through our website with the Vanco portal. In a time of less volunteerism due to Covid-19 and such, the online giving is less cumbersome and more streamlined for our Financial Secretary to manage. That being said, we would ask those of you giving through this online way to consider giving through your bank accounts (savings or checking) as opposed to using a credit/debit card. We are charged a 2.75% transaction fee whenever a credit/debit card is used, and while that may not seem like a lot for a \$25 offering (\$0.69 fee), for a \$500 offering (\$13.75 fee) those fees become quite significant. Again, we are grateful for any and all offerings and gifts to Christ Lutheran, but in order to be the best stewards of what God has entrusted to us we do kindly ask all of you credit debit card givers to consider using one of your bank accounts instead. Thank you.

Pumpkin Patch - We will host an unloading fellowship event on Sunday, October 15. At 6:00 p.m., we will form a pumpkin brigade to unload around 500 bulk pumpkins. Sign ups will begin in early September to register to serve in various ways with the patch, including for shifts to sell pumpkins thru October 31st. All church proceeds from this year's pumpkin patch will benefit the wonderful non-profit organization, Water to Thrive, which builds wells and helps to bring clean water to those living in rural parts of Africa.
